2018 ANNUM REPORT

Dear Friends,

As I sit down to write this letter to you, I am nearing my fifth anniversary as the President of the Lutheran Volunteer Corps. The most welcome and surprising part of my journey in this great organization is the community and fellowship that I have found in and with you all. I remain honored to serve in my role at LVC and find myself more passionate than ever about LVC's role in helping our nation faithfully unite people—especially now when the divisions in our country seem wider than ever.

Over the past five years, the LVC staff and board have spent many days in conversations to review and refine our strategic plan. As an organization that is committed to working across differences toward peace with justice, this has been time well spent.

We have taken our time to listen to one another, to discern, and to change our mind or relent on a topic in order to come to a decision by consensus. As I sit here writing this today, I can state with confidence that our entire board of directors and staff are on the same page about what we are trying to accomplish in our work and, maybe more importantly, where we draw our boundaries.

So, what is LVC today?

We remain a community of faith that unites people to work for peace with justice.

How do we know when we are succeeding?

- Our placement agencies report to us that we contribute to their missions.
- Our alumni remain active in the pursuit of peace with justice throughout their lives and attribute how they go about that to their LVC experience.
- The Volunteers, alumni, placements, and community members involved in our program grow and are increasingly diverse—especially in terms of race, sexual orientation and gender identity, faith practices, and socio-economic backgrounds.

Over the last year, we have come to agreement on these organizational objectives. We have now begun to refine our

program offerings to strengthen the skills, resolve, and efficacy of the generation of activists that will come through the LVC program over the next decade.

It is important to note that we have accomplished this by consensus and in community. Rather than choosing a course of action that seemed best to the majority, we engaged our differences to create a path to which we all could agree. In this way, perhaps more than any other, we are living into our mission.

Finally, as we nurture a generation of faithful activists, we believe in the value of our promise to volunteers, who through their experience in LVC will:

- Engage in a meaningful service experience in an area of their own justice passion.
- Learn tangible conflict resolution and consensus building skills while living in intentional community that will help in building coalitions and community in the future.
- Gain an understanding of the institutional and structural injustice and oppression in which we all have been socialized and in which all work toward peace with justice is accomplished.
- Be connected and energized by sources of spiritual strength that direct, impact, and sustain one's actions.

It is through this growth that our Volunteers will develop skills that will sustain them in their service throughout their lifetime.

May you be inspired to continue with us on this path. Thank you for journeying with us!
